

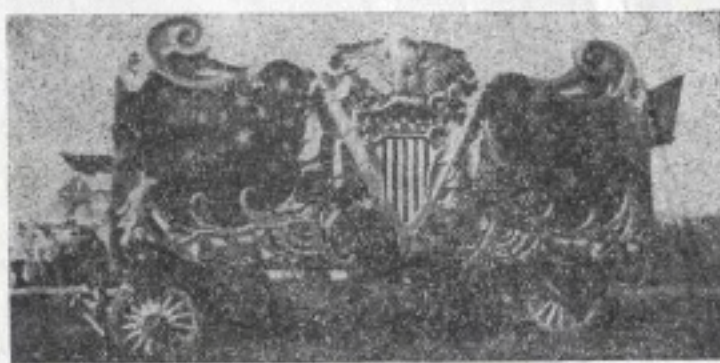

Thru a Foreign Newspaper File with T. PARKINSON

When BARNUM & BAILEY played Southampton, England, during the first European tour, it ran into opposition from 2 English Shows, and what appears to have been a tough city editor-but from evidence left in files of Southampton newspapers it seems that the Greatest Show on Earth came away the victor. On the way home from Germany I stopped in Southampton and looked up the dates. Here is the story:-

The paper was a Southampton & Hampshire weekly and the yr. 1898. The first wk. in Aug. the paper carried the first ad of the Big One. But prior to that it had published the ads of the LORD JOHN SANGER & SONS LTD. CIRCUS and of the LORD GEORGE, THE ORIGINAL SANGER & HIS £125,000 CIRCUS CO. Lord George ran a 5 in. 1 column ad for his date, which was July 29. He billed 12 elephants, 20 cages, a Spec called "WAR IN THE SUDAN" which included some cavalry and artillery units, and his free street parade.

Lord John's single ad appeared in the same issue below Lord George's and it was about the same size. John was a little more lively, he took this chance to make a couple of statements aimed at his 2 competitors. With Lord George in mind, this ad for the Aug. 9 date said that John had no connection with any other Sanger Circus and he also took steps to set the people straight about this American Show that was coming by repeating that Lord John's Circus was a native British concern. Perhaps it was in answer to this that later ads of B & B tried to point out that it, too, had strong British connections. Lord John then said that his show was founded in 1837, that it had 60 railroad cars, that it gave a free street parade, and that it would operate a ticket agency in a local shop. Top billing went to DICK MARSH, "whip" or driver of the longest team of horses ever driven. How this string long hitch compared with the famed B & B 40 horse team would be interesting to know. The single ads of these 2 shows were the only mention of either in the paper with the exception of 1 line notices in a calendar of events column. There were no more ads, no news stories, no articles about the features, no reviews of the shows. Press agents, if they had them, did not score.

Then came BARNUM & BAILEY. The Big One placed 3 full column ads. Getting the biggest play was the 40 horse team in the street parade and the Spec "COLUMBUS RETURNS TO BARCELONA". The 3 identical ads gave prominence to 2 formal announcements by the management. One, in the style found so often in Barnum's ads, assured the towners that contrary to rumors the show never split in order to play 2 towns at once. The second seems to have been in answer to Lord John's left handed barb about being a British owned show. JAMES A. BAILEY'S ads featured winter quarters at STOKE-on-TRENT, England. The ads also mentioned 70 nearly 60 ft. cars, more about the parade, and JOHANNA, the gorilla. The press dep't scored, in addition to the usual 1 line mention there were 2 pre date news articles. They were short and written in the stilted style of the day.

BARNUM & BAILEY moved from nearby BOURNEMOUTH on the night of AUG. 20, a Sat. and arrived on Sun. for its dates of Mon. & Tues. AUG. 22 & 23, 1898. The next issue of the paper reviewed the shows stay in town. The good draft stock was mentioned and it was said that there were larger railway cars than England had seen. After erecting the show on a Sun. it was said that the lot was very quiet except for a preview given for the press. About this the reporter said only that it was truly the GREATEST SHOW ON EARTH.

The lot was too small for the show and so one 60 ft. middle piece was left out of the Big Top, leaving not quiet 15,000 seats. But 13,000 saw each of the four performances and there were tremendous crowds at

the parade and when the show was loading out for its move to PORTSMOUTH The show was mentioned by name twice more. Once in connection with the arrest of a pickpocket and again when ticket scalpers were arrested. Then the newspaper wound up its coverage of B & B with a corker. No actual review of the performance itself was given because, the article said, those who saw the show know what was included and the report was omitting that detail so as not to make those who did not see it feel bad.

His Famous Wild West Exhibition Coming Soon

Cheap Excursion Rates On All Railroads

Lieutenant General J.M.Schofield retired, and recalled from private life to act as military adviser to President McKinley during the war with Spain said recently; Whether this war be brief or prolonged duration it has done one thing of incalculable value to the country, and that is, it has aroused the patriotism of the people-which lies too long dormant in times of peace. In fact almost the only institution to excite the military spirit in the youth of the land has been a show-BUFFALO BILL'S WILD WEST and in that respect Col.Cody's exhibition is a real institution rather than a show.

Was ever another such compliment paid to any sort of an amusement exhibition? When its character is understood, Gen.Schofield's compliment is justified. It is distinctively an international military tournament of real soldiers from the cavalry and artillery of England, Germany, Russia, Cuba and the U.S. Over 100 Indian chiefs and warriors from the 6 great tribes show the savage soldier; Mexican vanqueros, Guaches of Argentina; Arabs and Moors of Asia and Africa have also seen service in the armies of their respective countries. The band of Cuban veterans, wounded and maimed until their fighting days are ended, still can sit in the saddle and show the stamp of men who have fought so valiantly to free Cuba. A superb military spectacle, CUSTER'S LAST BATTLE produced with splendid special scenery and hundreds of soldiers and savages in mimic combat as realistic as the real is still another thing that will excite in everyone the desire to see the greatest of all exhibitions when it appears at Oshkosh Aug. 2. Excursion rates will be made on all lines of travel to the Wild West on that day.

(Aug. 6 paper report) BUFFALO BILL'S WILD WEST SHOW proved a great attraction to the people of Omro and vicinity on Tues. and the man who did not have a small boy of his own borrowed his neighbor's little Johnnie that he might have excuse to see the show himself. And see it they did. Long before many of the village people had thought of arising the teams came into town from all directions on the way to the city to see Will and his wooly west riders. At ten o'clock in town livery rigs were at a premium and by noon there were no rigs to be had. Many went on wheels and those who did came home any old way. The steamer Fashion arrived here shortly after 8 o'clock with a large number on board and was reinforced by a crowd from here. Oshkosh presented a busy appearance for one day at least, but as it is the only town in the vicinity where Buffalo Bill's Show appeared the people took advantage of the occasion to go. Several thousand saw the afternoon show but the rain setting in about 6 o'clock lessened the crowd at the evening show. The Fashion arrived at Omro at 8 P.M. with a very tired crowd aboard.

DAY and DATE

Just as the first section of the RINGLING BROS. & BARNUM & BAILEY CIRCUS pulled into New York the Wardie-Jay Circus opened its N.Y. date. Our contracting agent made the arrangements with the manager of the ADAI HATS store, right at the entrance to Madison Square Garden. We opened Mar. 29th for a 45 day run and the opening was to a turnaway crowd as the fight was on in the Garden. While we were unloading our flats and stocks we were visited by Eddie Jackson of the #1 Advertising car of R.B.B.E. We went over to the Hotel Lincoln and was greeted by Mr. A. Lester who took us to Mr. Hoppers room and when he saw our Two Jester Calliope he smiled and said give the boys what they want.

 VAN MATRE and PoP BARRETT went to Phoenixville to see the BRADLEY and BENSON CIRCUS but due to a high wind they did not put it up.

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 TED BOWMAN caught the DAILEY BROS. CIRCUS at Temple, Tex. on the 18th and spent a very enjoyable day. He met JEAN ALLEN, NORMA DAVENPORT, Tiger Bill, Tom O'Brien, M. Pyle and J. Murphree. The show was on 20 cars. Tex Stuart did the painting and every wagon has some large animal on it. New canvas was expected shortly and they are carrying 3 liberty drills. One group is of 8 spotted horses, one of 8 Palaminos and the other is of 6 spotted ones. The last named group was broken during the winter and did not work because they were not used to the railroad cars and were sick. M. Pyle is riding J. Allens waltzing and rearing horse.

 IVAN MYERS wonders whether P.T. BARNUM had more than one show on the road in 1875. The route book lists P.T. BARNUM'S GREAT ROMAN HIPPODROME for Milwaukee, Wis. on Aug. 27 and 28. He has clippings to prove that a Barnum show was in Wheeling, W. Va. on Sat. Aug. 28th of that year under the title P.T. Barnum's Traveling World's Fair. From Wheeling the show went to Barnesville, then to Cambridge, then to Caldwell, all in Ohio. The latter town was billed for two days and P.T. was scheduled to speak before a Soldiers meeting.

In 1878 the route book lists Wheeling, W. Va. for Sept. 13th and Washington, Pa. for the 14th. Both these dates were cancelled because of railroad washouts and the show went direct from Steubenville, Ohio, its Sept. 12th date to Altoona, Pa. for the Sept. 16th showing.

In 1888 the route book listed the title as BARNUM and BAILEYS GREATEST SHOW ON EARTH but for the Wheeling, W. Va. date at least it was billed under the title of BARNUM and LONDON'S FIFTEEN NEW UNITED SHOWS.

 H. SYMONS writes that in 1870 P.T. BARNUM stood at the corner of Wyoming Ave. and Lackawanna selling the story of his life and at the same time his Circus was showing out on the lot to a turn away crowd. The book was sold for a dollar. The first known appearance of RINGLING BROS. in the city of Scranton was in 1903.
