BUFFALO BILL ENTERS GERMANY

(Special to The Billboard.)

WE closed our ten days' engagement at Budapest, the Hungarian capital, June 25. Our success here helped us greatly upon our provincial tour. Our first stand was at Miskolcz, 115 miles from the metropolis, where we played to turnaway business.

Kassa, 26; Nagyvar, 27; Munkacs, 28, and Nyiregyhaza, 29, were all good notwithstanding the fact that we were right in the midst of their harvest. (Hungary is purely an agricultural country. Their methods of harvesting are primitive and a majority of the population is in the field this time of the year.)

Debreczen, 30-July 1 was good and we gave three performances to big houses. At Bekesabaz, 2, Mrs. Fred Bailey Hutchinson was reminded of her birthday by the receipt of numerous handsome presents. At this place is buried Henry (Patty) Clark, who was interred here in May, 1901, by the Tigers of the Barnum & Bailey Show. Immediately after our matinee performance a large number of our showmen repaired to the grave and held services. Speeches were made and Prof. Sweeney's Band rendered appropriate selections. To illustrate the friendly feelings that the Hungarians entertain for a stranger, I will mention the fact that Mr. Clark died just before the show's departure and one man was left behind to attend to the burial. He experienced no difficulty because it is said that five hundred school children marched in the funeral procession and natives assisted in other ways. The burial lot belongs to the Tigers and an appropriate monument has been erected over the grave. Showmen should never forget Jake Posey, a Cincinnati man, who is the father of this lodge.

Two big houses greeted us at Szentes July 3, and we celebrated the Fourth at Szeged. (John Lovely says that you must partake of at least two bottles of Budweiser to pronounce these names correctly.) The front of the show was artistically draped in tri-colored bunting. Caterer Ballard gave us a fine dinner, Sweeney's Band rendered good old Yankee airs and we almost felt as if we were at home rather than on the frontier of Europe and Asia.

At Nagai-Kikinda, 5, we were only two hours from Belgrade, Servia, and a big percentage of our audiences was Servians. The side-show opening was made in four languages—German, Hungarian, Servian and Roumanian. Nagy-Beeskerek, 6, turned out good at night. At Panscova the following night we were just across the river from Belgrade and our house was full of fashionables from the Servian capital.

Versecz, 8, and Tamas-var, 9, were only fair. The following two days we stopped at Arad. Harry Lummins, one of the English dancers, sustained a broken leg on the 10th and we left him at Arad where he is doing nicely.

On the 13th we played Nagy-Lzeben (Hermanstadt), a big garrison town where only German is spoken. eW arrived late, but opened in time and did big business both afternoon and night.

At Schassberg-Segevar, 16, openings were made in two tongues as the city people speak German is spoken. We arrived late, but opened garlan language.

Jake Platt's "stake and chain zoo" has been unfortunate lately. First, a band of gypsies stole the pet lamb, and on the 17th Dick, the pet monkey, laid down and died. He was buried at the side of wagon No. 12 and a cross bearing the following inscription was erected over the grave:

To the memory of Dick,
The pet of the show;
Though only a monkey his virtues we know:
He never complained,
Be it rain, wind or snow,
If monkeys reach heaven,
It is there he will go.

Lady Rafferty, an intelligent fox-terrier, who was his boon companion in life, was chief mourner.

At Kolosvar, 18, we were surrounded by an immense cattle market. Some of their steers are long horned and there are thousands of water buffalo similar to the Philippine caribou, which they work like oxen.

Kolosvar (Klansenburg), 19; Nagyvarad (Grobwardeln), 20, and Szatmar-Nemeti, 21, were all good. At the latter place we did not arrive until 10 A. M., but opened on time. It is a Jewish city and the 21st was their Sabbath. The afternoon house was fair, but there is a big advance sale for to-night.

The weather has been extremely hot and dry all through Hungary. Though business has been good, we will all be glad when we get out of it. Everything must be done through interpreters and there is so much linguistic and political prejudice that in an endeavor to please everybody one is continually in hot water. It has indeed been a trying time and the nervous strain that Col. Cody, Manager Hutchinson and their staff have been under for the past month could scarcely be endured by men of less mental capacity. We go back to Austria at Kolomes, July 23, for three weeks and enter Germany at Zittau Aug. 15.

SHOWMAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

While watching a gunsmith repair a revolver at Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 6, John Jenkins, an employe of the Pawnee Bill Wild West, was shot in the abdomen by an accidental discharge of the weapon. The show's physician attended Jenkins until the show left the city when he was removed to the hospital. It is thought he will recover. Jenkins is the son of Charles Jenkins, the iron-jawed man who died about three years ago.

WIND NEMESIS FOLLOWS
PAWNEE BILL SHOW

Several employes of the Pawnee Bill Wild West were injured, a broncho was killed, and the matinee audience was thrown into a panic at Harrisburg, Pa., Aug. 6.

Several women in the main tent fainted from fright and were taken to homes in the vicinity of the show grounds. As the wind blew a hurricane and the rain came in blinding sheets, the people on the seats began to stampede for shelter. Several were knocked down, a number fell from high seats in their efforts to get to the ground and others were badly squeezed in the crush, but nobody was seriously injured. Just as the people got safely away the horse tent of the circus fell with a crash and one of the bronchos was caught beneath a pole and killed. The show property was more or less considerable damaged.

It will be recalled that the Pawnee Bill Show was visited by a storm at Bayonne, N. J., July 17, when Major Gordon W. Little was struck by a falling tent pole and sustained a severe dislocation of one of his shoulders.

101 RANCH CELEBRATES

The Miller Brothers are going to put on another show at their 101 Ranch, near Bliss, Oklahoma. The event will take place this year, Sept. 15 and 16.

As upon a similar occasion last year, there will be an exhibition of Indians and Indian relics and workmanship. Incidentally the ranch will receive some publicity.

It is estimated that 65,000 people visited 101 Ranch last year, and it is hoped to increase the figure at the celebration of Cherokee strip in September.

WILL HELP SICK OR DISABLED

The Benevolent Order of Tom-Toms is the name of a new order that has been formed among the members of the Yankee Robinson Show, the title being in honor of Tom-Tom, the big elephant with the show. It is strictly a benevolent order. Each member pays a fee of twenty-five cents per week and this fund is given to the first person that is disabled from work by sickness or accident. The officers are J. N. Sechrest, Chief Tom; E. H. Hays, Royal Tooster; C. W. Buchanan, deacon, and Howard Webb, Little Tom.

Somehow it won't be you!

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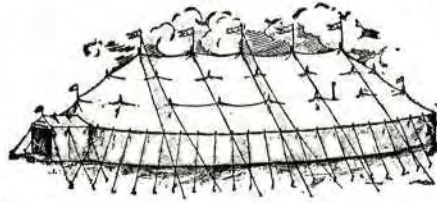
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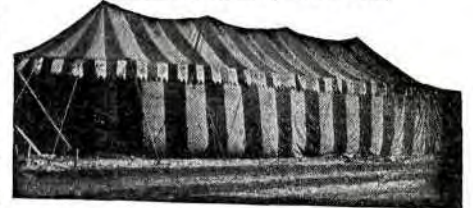

Show people will be glad to learn that the reported death of Mrs. C. I. Norris was false. It was Mr. Norris' sister-in-law who died.

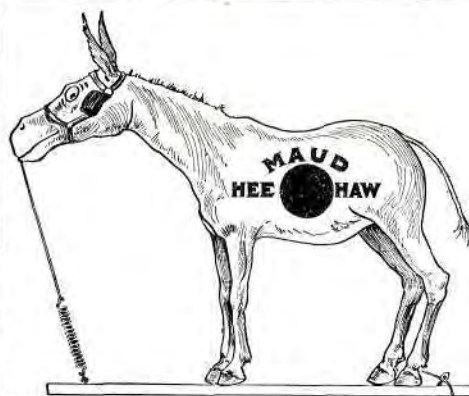
CIRCUS GOSSIP

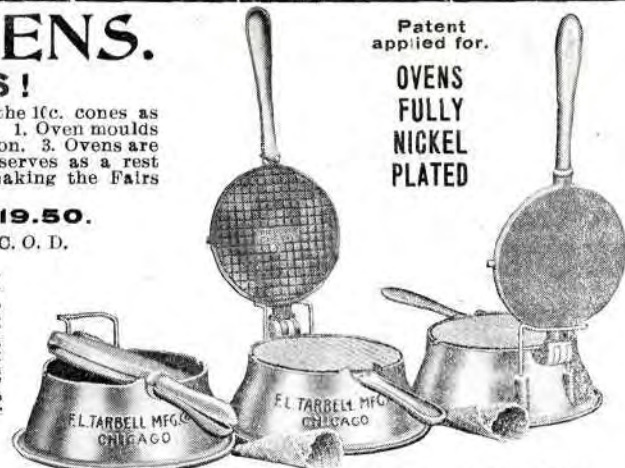

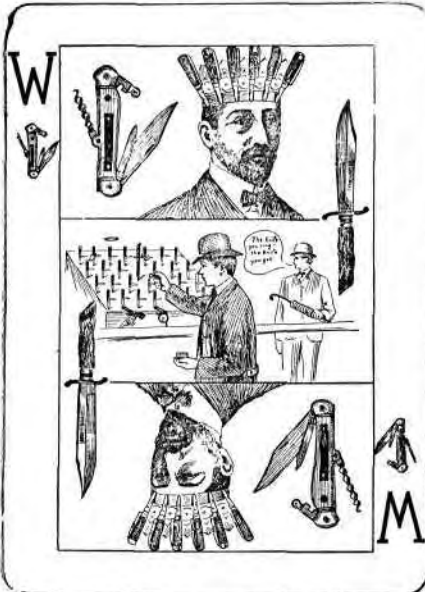
